All in red

In 1964 manager Bill Shanky wanted his team to be more distinctly dressed, he changed the white shorts and socks to red. Shankly thought the all red strip would carry a psychological impact, “red for danger, red for power”

Anfield

Built in 1884, home to Liverpool FC since 1892. Situated in Stanley Park. Since becoming an all-seater stadium with a capacity of 45,276. Comprising of four stands : Spion Kop, Main Stand, Centenary Stand and Anfield Road

Anfield Road End

Rebuilt in 1965 and fitted with a roof, furnished with seats in 1982. A second tier was added in 1998. This stand houses the away fans, has a capacity of 6,391

Michael Owen is the only Liverpool player to receive the Ballon d’Or (Golden Ball) 2001

Bronze statue

Outside the stadium, unveiled in December 1997, a bronze statue of Bill Shankly, standing 8ft , inscribed are the words “Bill Shankly He Made the People Happy”

Biggest attendance

61,905 Liverpool v Wolverhampton Wanderers in 1952. This was prior to the stadium becoming an all-seater

Boot room

Started out as a storage room that Bill Shanky utilised as a place to discuss tactics. The founder members were Bill Shankly, Joe Fagan, Bob Paisley and Reuben Bennett. It became almost a training room for future Liverpool managers

Centenary Stand

Originally named the Kemlyn Road stand. A second tier was added in 1992 and was renamed to mark the club's hundredth anniversary. This stand houses the executive boxes. The stand's capacity is 11,762

Consecutive wins in Europe

Liverpool are one of only two English clubs to retain the European Cup (1976/1977 & 1977/1978) (the other being Nottingham Forest)

Crest

The symbol of the city of Liverpool, the liver bird was adopted as the club crest in 1901, it was only included on the kit in 1955. The bird is placed inside a shield above which shows the Shankly Gates with two flames on either side, with the words "You'll Never Walk Alone"

Crazy Horse

Nickname of former captain Emlyn Hughes, attributed to his charges out of defence with the ball

Friendly Derby

The Merseyside Derby was referred to as “The Friendly Derby” because of the large number of families who had both Liverpool and Everton supporters. It is one of the few derbies that does not enforce fan segregation, it is not uncommon to see Everton and Liverpool fans sitting together

First FA Cup final

In 1914 Liverpool's reached the FA Cup Final (the last to be held at Crystal Palace), it was also the first Final attended by the reigning monarch (King George V) Liverpool lost 0-1 to Burnley

- 📅 Took over from Bob Paisley. In his first season (1983/1984) Liverpool became the first team to win three major trophies in one season (League title, League Cup and the European Cup). The following season Liverpool reached the final of the European Cup but lost to Juventus. The match was overshadowed by off field events, in which 39 people were killed. Fagan retired from football following the Heysel Disaster

Gates

- ◆ Paisley Gate
In tribute to Bob Paisley, the gates were erected at the Kop, the design includes the three European Cups he won, the crest of his birthplace (Hetton-le-Hole) and the club name

Erected at the Anfield Road end in 1982, the design includes the Scottish flag, a Scottish thistle, the club badge and the words "You'll Never Walk Alone"

John Houlding

Founder of Liverpool FC. He was the owner of Anfield and the president of Everton FC. Anfield was originally the home of Everton FC, but following a dispute between Houlding and the Everton Committee over rent, Everton left Anfield for a new stadium (Goodison Park), leaving Anfield without a team.

John McKenna was appointed to create a new team. He signed thirteen professionals for the club, eight of which were Scottish. A new name was chosen "*Everton FC and Athletic Grounds Ltd*", "*Everton Athletic*" for short, however this was rejected by the Football Council, In June 1892 Liverpool FC and Athletic Grounds were registered as a new team

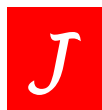
Heysel Stadium Diaster

A dark period in Liverpool's history. 39 Juventus fans were killed, when a section of a wall collapsed due to fighting between rival fans. English clubs were banned from European competition for five years with Liverpool serving a six year ban

Kop

Stand along the Walton Breck Road, the editor of the Liverpool Daily Post in 1906 christened it the Spion Kop, named after a famous hill in South Africa where a local regiment suffered heavy losses during the Boer War in 1900. More than 300 soldiers died, many of them were from Liverpool.

The Kop had a capacity of 30,000, before it was demolished in 1994 and replaced with an all-seater terrace, now it now holds 12,409. The Kop is the largest single tier stand in Europe

Merseyside Derby

The oldest top-flight derby in England is between Liverpool and Everton







- ◆ The first league match was on the 13 October 1894 at Goodison Park - (Liverpool lost 3-0)
- ◆ The first league match at Anfield was on the 17 November 1894 - (drew 2-2)
- ◆ It took another four meetings before Liverpool beat Everton -25 September 1897 at Anfield (2-1)
- ◆ Record attendance – 18 September 1948 (Division One) Goodison Park : 78,599 : (drew 1-1)

North-West Derby

- ◆ First match at Old Trafford : 19 February 1910 : Liverpool won 3-4
- ◆ 21 March 2010 was the 179th meeting between the two clubs (Liverpool lost 2-1 at Old Trafford)
